Agreeing

Right! / Absolutely! / I totally agree!

That sounds convincing.

I'm totally with you on this.

I agree in principle but ...

I partly agree with you. / I agree with you to some extent.

Disagreeing

Sorry, but that is not the way I see it.

I see what you mean but I don't believe that ...

Well, I don't quite go along with you here.

I'm not sure you're on the right track when you say that ... because ...

I'm sorry, but I'm not (yet) convinced because ...

What bothers me about that is ... because ...

You might be mistaken here.

I'm not sure it's as simple as that / this makes sense.

I would question that argument.

Convincing your partner

There is strong evidence/It is common knowledge/The scientific community agrees that ...

Research suggests that ...

From my own experience, I can assure you that ...

Let's agree on the most important aspects.

Agreeing

Now let's see where we agree and where we disagree.

So, to put it in a nutshell/to wrap things up ...

Now let's quickly go through the issues again that have been raised.

We are almost finished, and I would like to briefly sum up/conclude by saying ...

Time is almost up so we should reach a decision.

I guess we must agree to disagree and we will have to come up with a different solution.

Conversational strategies



Clarifying the task

Now, let's see what we have to do.

Let's look at the steps we have to take.

What would you suggest - how do we go about this?

Correcting misunderstandings

I'm afraid there has been some misunderstanding.

That's not quite what I meant by ...

You misunderstood. What I actually said/meant was that ...

Interrupting politely

I'm sorry to interrupt you but ...

Excuse me, can I just stop you there for a moment/a second?

I apologize for interrupting but I think you misunderstood me.

Sorry, can I just make a point?

Dealing with interruptions

I'm afraid haven't finished yet (with making my point).

If I might just finish ...

I'd appreciate it if you would hear me out first.

Keeping the talk focused

I think we're straying from the topic just now.

Is this really part of what we have to do?

I think we are digressing.

I'm sure this is an interesting topic, but in this context I feel it won't get us anywhere.

I think we're going round in circles. / This isn't getting us anywhere.

Playing for time / asking for clarification

Sorry, could you repeat what you just said?

Excuse me, I didn't quite catch that/what you just said.

Did I understand you correctly? Did you mean to say ...?

I'm afraid I did not quite get what you just said.

When you say: ..., what exactly do you mean by that?

Could you explain this to me once more please?

So, if I understand you correctly, you are saying that ...

Am I right in thinking that you mean ...?

I'm trying to figure out how what we just said relates to the task at hand.

Let me take a look at my notes for a second to make sure that I get this right.
